## Chairman's Message



# **Building Pallitathya Model**

D.Net's Research on Linkage of ICTs and Poverty has launched for ground test

D.Net's research on harnessing the linkage between ICTs and poverty alleviation has launched for ground test in September 2005. D.Net started working on this issue since 2001. Starting with the research on information need identification for the poor and by the poor in 2003, D.Net launched the functional Pallitathya Kendra (Rural Information Centre - RIC) in September 2005. The objectives of the research are to assess: i) the effectiveness of livelihood information through different ICT channels and ii) the impact on the poor through

establishment of Pallitathya kendra itself and iii) the deployment of *mobile ladies* for getting access to expert consultation through mobile phone. The research thrives to address two fundamental questions: one, how ICTs can be a useful tool for improving access to livelihood information and; two, how the interface of ICT and improved access to information address poverty alleviation dimension. The research targets to build a Pallitathya model based on learning from the ground.

# **Building Pallitathya Model**

D.Net's Research on Linkage of ICTs and Poverty has launched for ground test



The interim research findings show that D.Net's Pallitathya model produces real results at the grassroots level in improving access to information. Since 2005 through four Pallitathya Kendra located in remote rural areas more than 10,000 villagers received both information and ancillary services, which had three types of poverty alleviation implications: a. in some cases they could save cost of livelihood, b. in some cases they could create opportunities to earn more, c. in other cases they could prevent potential loss of property, life and rights.

The carefully crafted mechanisms through Pallitathya Kendra allowed D.Net's model to reach particularly women and people with various handicaps who seldom go outside their homes. The innovations and critical elements of the intervention are:

**1.** Focus on needs of the poor, rather than focus on the technology through which D.Net identified information needs and other livelihood needs through participatory research.

- **2.** Focus on 'no exclusion' policy induced confidence within rural community to think that the RICs for all groups in the rural society. This policy was implemented through two specific design elements: **a.** As a vast share of rural community is illiterate,
- a. As a vast share of rural community is illiterate, the concept of "infomediary" [information intermediary, a human interface between knowledge-base and rural illiterate people] could allow these group to get the benefit of technology in receiving solutions to their livelihood problems;
- **b.** As women have limited mobility due to social taboo and people with physical handicap can seldom visit the RICs, the concept of 'mobile lady' [ a female information worker with a cell phone connected to the help-desk comprising experts in different livelihood topics. The service is called help line] could allow D.Net's model reach everybody in a village.
- **3.** Focus on 'no refusal policy' could enable rural community to rely that whatever problem they have, if they come to the RIC, they will definitely get an advice. This policy was possible to implement thanks to the concept of 'combination of computer based knowledge base' and help line.

# **Building Pallitathya Model**

#### D.Net's Research on Linkage of ICTs and Poverty has launched for ground test

Once a villager calls to the help desk, the reply is guaranteed, either immediately, or after a reasonable time [depending on complexity of problem, experts collect answers and respond through mobile, e-mail, letter, whatever way feasible]

- 4. Focus on demand-driven content in local language, which contains information and knowledge to the livelihood problems of the villagers. This content is branded as 'JEEON-IKB'. With the support of International Development Research Center (IDRC), Manusher Jonno Foundation (MJF) and Research Initiative, Bangladesh (RIB), D.Net was able to develop significant volume of content, which is used in the RICs. This browser-based IKB (Information and Knowledge Base) is going to be used by a huge number of institutions.
- **5.** Combination of core information service and ancillary services, which is although complementary in nature rather conflicting in terms of skills requirement of the infomediary. Such approach allows the RICs to generate revenue.
- 6. Focus on community relationship and inspiration of local institutions. Involvement of the local institutions brought new ideas about sustainability: both financial and social. The research proved that if local institutions brace the concept and the community sees the benefits, they take care of both the financial and the social sustainability.

The pragmatic approach and on-the-ground success inspired a number of institutions, both national and local, to initiate telecentres across the country. D.Net actively works with organisations who want to replicate its model with little necessary twists and an approach to financial sustainability. For example, D.Net's work with KATALYST, a project jointly funded by DFID, SDC, Sida, and CIDA supports a number of telecentres designed for providing information services to the MSMEs. D.Net conducted market research on this concept for KATALYST and recommended for the contentfocused approach. Grameen Phone, the largest telco in Bangladesh also replicates D.Net's combination of elements in its CICs [Community Information Centres] since 2006. The CICs are however modelled very much on an income-driven approach. It also replicates Help Line, only for health related issues. More than 30 organisations contacted D.Net to collaborate for establishment of telecentres for improving access to livelihood information. D.Net is now promoting idea of "Mission 2011" in line with Mission 2007 of India to major institutions to initiate establishment of telecentres in rural Bangladesh so that every village has access to community based telecentres on the occasion of 40th anniversary of independence of Bangladesh.

# Global Gender and ICT Awards 2005 D.Net's first international recognition

"The Global Knowledge Partnership (GKP) salutes shining examples of promoting information and communication technologies for development (ICT4D)," announced Rinalia Abdul Rahim, Executive Director of GKP during the declaration of the Gender and ICT Awards 2005. The ceremony was held at the World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS) in Tunis, capital city of Tunisia on 15 November 2005. Earlier, the certificate was presented at Association for Women's Rights in Development (AWID) Forum held on October 27-30, 2005 in Bangkok, Thailand. The GICT Awards 2005 (www.genderawards.net) was opened to civil organisations, community-based groups, networks and social movements in Asia Pacific, with women particularly the girls as target beneficiaries.

The Association for Progressive Communications Women's Networking Support Programme (APC WNSP), a global network that support women networking for social change and women's empowerment through the use of ICTs (www.apcwomen.org), was the co-sponsor of this award along with Swiss Agency Development and Cooperation (SDC), Department for the International Development (DfID), Microsoft Corporation and GKP. These awards recognise innovative and effective projects for the promotion of women's economic empowerment. Pallitathya Help Line project brought D.Net the Championship in 2005's Global Gedner and ICT Awards. The uniqueness of this project is the concept of mobile operator ladies deployed in the community to enable women to place agriculture, health, legal right and other livelihood questions to an "expert help desk" via a mobile phone.



JEEON-IKB:

Making ICT relevant to Poor People

Bangla language livelihood information and knowledge base

The JEEON-IKB (Information and Knowledge Base) is a content database developed in Bangla language and preserved in CD format. A package of nine CDs JEEON-IKB aims to contribute in improving particularly the rural livelihood through ICTs. The database is kept in CDs so that they can be used in the locations without Internet connectivity. The database has been developed on the basis of cognitive research to raise its acceptability as a source of useful information in the rural context. The JEEON-IKB content in simple non-technical language responds to everyday queries such as what, where, who, how in the areas of agriculture, education, healthcare, non-farm economic activities, apprppriate technology, human rights, awareness and disaster management. The database can be accessed by the illiterate villagers with the aid of the 'infomediaries' (people who can use JEEON-IKB to respond to queries). The crucial information they derive can help them reduce their livelihood costs or improve their income opportunities. The JEEON-IKB is more effective when used with Teletathya - people's call centre (mobile phone based information service). Through this system by calling the specialists at the Teletathya Help-Line peple can get information that they do not find in the CDs.



"The ever increasing gap between the rich and the poor in past few years has created such a huge depression that a storm is not far away. I believe that ICT can bridge that gap and make scopes for development," said Habibur Rahman, the former Chief Justice and Chief Advisor to the Caretaker Government at the launching evening of JEEON-IKB CDs on January 30, 2006. Presently the CDs contain images and graphics along with the texts. D.Net has started developing animated and audio-visual contents which will be later incorporated in JEEON-IKB database. 
## Bringing Underprivileged Rural Youth into ICT Learning

#### Computer Learning Programme of VAB-D.Net is expanding

Computer Learning Programme (CLP) is developed to promote knowledge about and usage of computer among the underprivileged rural youths in Bangladesh. For this 43 geographical locations were discovered comprised mainly of schools and of some colleges, libraries and community gathering places. Under the programme 2,553 young students were to receive computer training during 2005-2006. From each of these centres two teachers or persons having the basic knowledge about computer volunteered for computer trainer's training. A curriculum named Esho Computer Sikhie developed by D.Net was used for the training. D-Net trained altogether 88 such trainers, among which 15 were women, who going back to their respective centres imparted training to the students.

This programme is sponsored by non-resident Bangladeshis geared through Volunteers' Association for Bangladesh (VAB). Remarkably in 2005, Bank Asia, a commercial bank in Bangladesh sponsored three more centres.

The 5th anniversary programmes concluded with a fund raising dinner for CLP. Various national and international organisations participated in the event in which D.Net emphasised on mobilization of resources in Bangladesh as well as among the NRB community particularly in North America and in Europe.





## BDResearch.org

#### A new frontier for researchers

BORN is about efficient learning, teaching and, above all, sharing acquired or created knowledge through the convenience of a single website - to facilitate research, policy-making, businessplanning or report-writing in Bangladesh context.

- From July 2005 to December 2006 more than 1159 publications were downloaded from 30 countries other than Bangladesh. The major countries are: USA, UK, Canada, Japan, Australia, Germany, Netherlands, China, India, Pakistan, Korea, Ethiopia, Hong Kong, Saudi Arabia.
- During the period about 1200 users downloaded publications from this website. About 100 prepaid cards were sold and at present 27 cards have been activated.
- The website (www.bdresearch.org) was refurbished with new interface and some new features were added.

## A Road map of D.Net's Next Five Year

During the initial years, D.Net's main focus was ICT for Development. As a research institution, it needs important transition in terms of focusing on general economic and social development. With this view the organisation felt the need for a direction for its in next five-year journey. As a result, a process to develop the strategy for the period between 2006-07 and 2010-11 started in 2005. Through a rigorous brainstorming among the D.Net staff, board members and important ICT4D community leaders the five-year strategy was born to be coined as "Mission 2010". The Mission identifies the following themes for its activities the period of 2006-2010.

**Economic and Development Policy Research**

Step 3: Consultation with the experts and stakeholders at the annual retreat of D.Net held at Cox's Bazar and individual consultation.

**Step 4:** Preparation of a draft of Mission 2010 by the drafting committee based on the inputs from the staff and the stakeholders

**Step 5:** Circulation of the draft among all stakeholders and announcing it at the Anniversary Programme in January, 2006

Step 6: Finalisation of the draft at the Annual General Meeting of D.Net in April 2006.


# Research during 2006

# Events of D.Net during 2005-2006

Launching ceremony of the Country's First A-Z Medical Directory: Nobel Peace Prize Winner economist Professor Muhammad Yunus launched the book titled A-Z Medical Directory. This directory was published in collaboration with Health21, a civil society organization working on health. At the launching ceremony more than 200 eminent personalities and representatives from different sectors were present.

Workshop on ICT and Access to Justice: D.Net organised the workshop on September 2005. Advocate Sultana Kamal, former advisor of the caretaker government chaired the half-day workshop.

Submitting policy brief on Bangladesh's Position in the WSIS: D.Net officially submitted the policy brief titled WSIS Issues of Debate and Possible Position of Bangladeshi Delegation for PrepCom-3 to the government. The paper highlighted the issues of financial mechanisms of post WSIS programmes, particularly that of funding priority for development of locally relevant content, financing for development of regional Internet backbone, ICT infrastructure etc. The paper raised the issues of accountability of ICANN, the global administrator body for the internet, global internet pricing policy, and promotion of open source software and technologies.

Press Conference on MDGs and ICT: DNet's Achievements: The key contributions of D.Net were highlighted in this press conference on "Millennium Development Goals and Information and Communication Technologies: D.Net's Achievement" held at Dhaka Reporters' Unity office on September 26, 2005.

#### Participating in the Expo of Road to Tunis, Dhaka:

The "Road to Tunis" was organised by Ministry of

Science and ICT, GoB in collaboration with UNDP, Bangladesh on October 23-25, 2005. The best ICT4D initiatives in Bangladesh were showcased here including D.Net's programmes. The exposition received appreciation from the researchers and activists from country and aboard.

Organising seminar titled "Improving Access to Livelihood Information: Missing Dimension in Poverty Alleviation (Case Study Bangladesh)": The seminar was organized at the GKP Forum of the WSIS summit in Tunis on November 15, 2005 in collaboration with IDRC, Canada. In the seminar the speakers put emphasis on the issues of access to information as a part of access to resources, which are important for addressing the poverty on the whole.



Attending GKP Annual Meeting: D.Net attended the meeting on May 11, 2006 at Sarvodaya, Sri Lanka.

Attending the Resource Mobilization Workshop: D.Net team attended the workshop organised by GKP during May 12-13, 2006 in Sri Lanka.



## **D.Net's Future Programmes**

A negotiation is going on between D.Net and Microsoft about a project titled "CLICK'. More than 5000 underprivileged youth in rural Bangladesh is planned to be trained under this project using the Microsoft Unlimited Potential curriculum. The CLICK will be a hybrid of "Paliitathya Kendra" and " Community Learning centre (CLC)".

D.Net is negotiating with UNESCO Bangladesh to conduct a research on "Review the experiences of Bangladesh and countries in Asia-Pacific region in the use of ICT software in Literacy/Skills Training Programme".

D.Net is going to initiate Mission 2011 (every village an information centre), with participation participation of all stakeholders in Bangladesh and support of international network including telecentre.org .

For the first time in Bangladesh, D.Net in collaboration with BRAC University is going to introdcue a course on Development Informatics in the Masters programme of Development Studies department.

D.Net's Bangladesh Online Research Network and University of Sussex's ELDIS are jointly working on an agreement to promote online research reposithrough www.bdresearch.org tory and www.eldis.org.

D.Net is going to start more than 30 Pallitathya Kendras across Bangladesh in partnership with local NGOs and local government institutions with support of Manusher Jonno Foundation.

D.Net in collaboration with PKSF is going to initiate a project to integrate information services with the existing microfinance services. The initial pilot project will be carried out in five MFIs.

D.Net is collaborating with IDRC's PAN and BRAC University for a research project on Bangla localisation and testing the viability of Bangla OCR and other Bangla localisation tools.

In collaboration with TraidCraft D.Net is going to conduct a study on Purchasing Practice in the Readymade Garments Sector of Bangladesh.

D.Net and Transparency International Bangladesh are going to work together for promoting human rights and governance information through TIB's 36 information centres around the country.

D.Net is going to collaborate with Char Livelihood Programme of DFID to initiate the Pallitathya Kendra and Help Line model to address the information need of the Char dwellers.

D.Net is going to work with BRAC-IED and Foundation for Education Research and Innovation for integrating ICT in mainstream education through introducing digital learning toolkits along with formal text book based curriculum.

D.Net along with Sharvodaya, Sri Lanka is going to conduct a joint research on "Socio-anthropological and Economic Impact of ICT carried Livelihood on Rural Community" based on the telecentre experiences of Sri Lanka and Bangladesh.
